where citizens:

- are aware of their freedoms, and are able to exercise them;
- understand their responsibilities towards other citizens and the wider community, and fulfil them with conviction.

A liberal mayor will ensure citizens respect the rule of law and that the city administration has these objectives as priorities.

A liberal city is not a place of fear nor lawlessness, but rather a space of trust and justice.







where citizens:

- are directly involved in the decision-making processes, or feel that they are actively consulted and that their opinions are listened to and respected;
- are able to shape the future direction of their own lives and of their local community;
- individually or through civil society organisations, freely interact with their elected representatives and are able to hold them accountable.

A liberal mayor will be accessible to the citizens and will ensure the city council and administration actively reach out and encourage their participation in the decisions that affect them and will develop administrative capacity to focus on delivery of results.

A liberal city is not a place of submission, but rather a space for citizen government.







Inclusiveness and trust

where citizens:

- embrace diversity, because freedom and diversity are two sides of the same coin: there cannot be freedom without diversity and there cannot be diversity without freedom;
- welcome other citizens regardless of their geographical origin, ethnicity, religion, political beliefs, sexual orientation, etc.;
- contribute to building trust across communities, engaging in dialogue, sharing experiences, and working on joint initiatives.

A liberal mayor will set the example by reaching out to all citizens, building bridges not walls, and bringing all citizens together for dialogue and joint projects, and will ensure the city policies prevent the formation of ghettos of any kind. Ghettos destroy trust.

A liberal city is not a place of discrimination or rejection, but rather a space of association and respect.








Opportunity and social mobility

where citizens:

- are able to develop their ideas, talent, and expertise in new ways, quickly and easily;
- are encouraged and able to fulfil their potential by acquiring new knowledge and skills.

A liberal mayor will promote the talent factory by actively seeking to remove barriers that inhibit opportunity while protecting social cohesion, and will ensure city policies promote education, training, and accessibility.

A liberal city is not a place of fatalism, but rather a space of encouragement.







Knowledge, education and culture

where citizens:

- have spaces to learn, reflect, are inventive, express their ideas, and share them with other citizens;
- are able to develop the local culture and share it across borders.

A liberal mayor will encourage diverse cultural expression and the pursuit of knowledge.

A liberal city is not a place of ignorance, but a space of enlightenment.








where citizens:

• interact with other citizens, businesses, and public bodies, creating networks, connections and partnerships.

Openness to the world

where citizens:

- are able to connect with citizens from other places around the world;
- have the opportunity to meet and interact with people from other cultures;
- are able to inspire and be inspired through these interactions.

A liberal mayor will promote curiosity for the rest of the world.

A liberal city is not a place closed off from the world, but rather a space of global connections.
